

Recycling is required by law in New York City and collected in every building on campus. Recycle batteries, cell phones, and old mp3 players in the blue tubes in the lobbies of most buildings on campus. Follow the signs on or above bins around campus to help keep other recyclables from going to landfills:

Mixed Paper (cardboard, magazines, newspapers, paper bags, and pizza boxes) Glass, Plastic, Metal, and Cartons (glass bottles, plastic bottles, metal cans, juice boxes

Landfill (styrofoam, plastic grocery bags, food containers, paper cups and lids)



Compost is collected anywhere food is sold on campus. Composting reduces the amount of waste sent to landfill or incinerated. In addition to all types of food scraps, to-go cups, containers, cutlery and napkins sold at The New School are compostable. Compost is also collected every Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday at the Union Square Green Market. For more information go to bit.ly/greenmarketcompost.

The Food Recovery Network to donate our leftover food. **Humane Society of the United States** to promote Meatless Mondays. **The Green Restaurant Association** to further green our facilities. **Real Food Challenge** to analyze and increase our "Real Food" purchases.



Food from local farms travels fewer miles and is often less environmentally damaging than conventional produce. New Schoolers can purchase amazing local produce at the Union Square Greenmarket, open Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday.

Sign up with Corbin Hill Food Project, the farm share on campus, to have your produce delivered fresh from upstate farms. Corbin Hill delivers to the lobby at 2 West 13th Street for convenient pick-up. For more information go to bit.ly/CorbinHillAtTNS

Always check the Green Supply Center at 2 West 13th Street to up-cycle, recycle, and sustainably dispose of excess materials. The New School's libraries and computer labs are great places to research, study and create. Be sure to make the most of your printing credit by printing double sided whenever possible.



If you choose to reduce your carbon footprint and increase your physical fitness by biking, you can store your bike in the bike storage room in the University Center, or lock it on a bike rack on the street.

Materials flow in and out of The New School every day: food is delivered to the cafeterias, paper and supplies are delivered to offices and libraries, students and faculty bring in supplies to support their research and school projects. The left-over, unused, and disposed-of materials are collected by Facilities and brought back out to the street where they are picked up by the city or our contracted haulers and transported to landfills, recycling or composting centers.



Over 70% of disposable bottles will end up in a landfill, stream, or ocean. The New School does not sell bottled water. New York City has some of the cleanest tap water in the country. Bring your own bottle and take advantage of FREE refilling stations all over the campus.



Personal sustainability means developing good self-care practices. Visit these spaces to rest, relax, or even squeeze in a power nap when your body needs to recharge.



The New School's libraries, the Vera List Courtyard and Street Seats (summer only) are great places to sit, study, and observe.
