Active Versus Passive Learning

The first eight methods listed are active learning methods. They engage you in an active way with the material you need to know and help you retain it for later use. If you currently use them, keep up the good work!

Methods nine through thirteen are passive learning methods. If your use them alone, you will be less likely to retain the material you are studying. They can easily be turned into active learning methods.
