SCHOLARS AND RESEARCHERS: NEW AND CONTINUING CASES

BAHRAIN

Prison sentences have been handed to JALILA AL-SALMAN and MAHDI 'ISSA MAHDI ABU DHEEB, both board members of the Bahrain Teachers' Association, arrested on charges of "inciting hatred against the regime" and "calling to overthrow and change the regime by force" following the group's call for a teacher strike in March 2011. They have been sentenced to three and ten years, respectively. Amnesty International has expressed serious concerns about Mahdi's health and fears that he may die in prison. During a hearing in December 2011, Mahdi showed clear signs of having been beaten while in detention.

Previously featured scholars from Bahrain who remain in prison include DR. ABDUL-JALIL AL-SINGACE, a professor of engineering at

the University of Bahrain, sentenced to life imprisonment on June 22, 2011, on charges of training and financing a terrorist organization, and reportedly tortured during his pre-trial detention; and RULA AL SAFFER, an assistant professor at the College of Health Sciences and the head of the Bahrain Nursing Society, sentenced on September 29, 2011, to 15 years in prison.

The threats to scholars in Bahrain extend beyond the individual cases reported here. According to a report from Scholars at Risk, in the year since pro-democracy protests began in February 2011, at least 100 faculty and staff have been dismissed from the University of Bahrain for participating in the protests, and over 500 students have been suspended or expelled.

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CHINA

Scholars featured in previous issues who remain in prison in China include writer and editor **TASHI RABTEN** (pen name **TE'URANG**), sentenced to four years' imprisonment on June 2, 2011, for his critical political writings; **LIU XIAOBO**, a human rights activist and 2011 Nobel Peace Prize laureate, held in an undisclosed location in Beijing since his arrest in December 2008 for "inciting subversion of state power"; and **GUO QUAN**, a former literature professor at Nanjing Normal University, sentenced to 10 years in prison and 3 years of deprivation of politi-

cal rights in October 2009 on charges of "inciting subversion of state power."

IRAN

MASSOUD SEPEHR, a political science lecturer at Shiraz Azad University, has been detained without charge since his arrest on November 17, 2011. According to a report from his wife, published by the International Campaign for Human Rights in Iran, security officials initially advised her not to speak with the media about the arrest so that the charges could be cleared quickly. In the months that have passed, officials have not provided reasons for the arrest. Sepehr suffers from several health problems, including high blood pressure and kidney problems, and is at risk of severe complications if he is not attended by a physician.

SOHRAB RAZZAGHI, a former faculty member and head of the Volunteer Actors Institute, an organization dedicated to research and education of activists and civil society organizers, was sentenced to 20 years in prison in October 2011. Neither he nor his lawyer was present at his own trial and there is no possibility of appeal. He was arrested in October 2007 and was held in solitary confinement for one month in Evin Prison without access to legal counsel. Razzaghi was formerly a professor at Allameh Tabatabaee's Law and Political Science College but was fired in 2005 during a wave of politically motivated dismissals of critical scholars. According to the International Campaign for Human

Rights in Iran, other detainees were forced into making false confession against Razzaghi, who has denied the charges against him.

Scholars from Iran who remain in prison include seven people connected to the Baha'i Institute for Higher Education, following coordinated attacks on the Institute in May 2011, including KAMRAN MORTEZAIE and VAHID MAHMOUDI, each sentenced to five years, and RAMIN ZIBAIE, MAHMOUD BADAVAM, FARHAD SEDGHI, RIAZ SOBHANI, and NOUSHIN KHADEM, each sentenced to four years; three cultural figures, all charged with "acting against national security" through supporting Kurdish opposition groups, including poet JAMAL KHANI, serving a two-year sentence; educator FARHAD VAKILINIA serving three years; NAEEM NAJAFI, a student, serving four years, and Kurdish author and scholar SAJJAD JAHANFAR serving one year; religious scholar AHMAD GHABEL, who re-entered jail on July 31, 2011, to begin a twenty-month sentence on charges of acting against the regime and national security; and DR. MOSTAFA ALAVI, an Iranian doctor and researcher sentenced to fifteen years in August 2008 for "plotting against the regime."

RUSSIA

SVYATOSLAV BOBYSHEV and **YEVGENY AFANASYEV**, both professors at Baltic State Technical University in St Petersburg Russia, have been detained without formal charges or trial since March 2010. The professors are accused of spying and passing state secrets to China.

SAUDI ARABIA

DR. SA'UD MUKHTAR AL-HASHIMI, a medical doctor and faculty member at the King Abdulaziz University, was sentenced in November 2011 to 30 years in prison, which is to be followed by a 30-year travel ban. He had been awaiting trial in solitary confinement since his arrest on February 2, 2007. Prior to his arrest, al-Hashimi had called for greater transparency in research centers of academics and religious scholars. According to a report from the Islamic Human Rights Commission, he has faced torture throughout his detention.

Previously featured scholars from Saudi Arabia who remain in prison include DR. YUSUF AL-AHMAD, an Islamic scholar who teaches at Imam Muhammad bin Sa'ud University in Riyadh, arrested after posting a YouTube video critical of long-term detentions of security suspects without due juridical process; NADHIR AL-MAJID, a teacher and writer, detained on April 17, 2011, soon after the appearance of an article in which he criticized the Saudi government; and university professors SA'UD AL-DUGHAITHIR, MUHAMMAD BIN NASIR AL-GHAMIDI, and ABD AL-KARIM AL-KHADHAR, all members of a group of nine intellectuals who drafted a party proposal seeking to create what would have been the first political party in Saudi Arabia, arrested on February 16, 2011.

ENDANGERED STUDENTS: NEW AND CONTINUING CASES BAHRAIN

HASSAN 'OUN, an 18-year-old student at the Shaikh Khalifa Institute of Technology, was reportedly subject to torture and other mistreatment during his detention by authorities after being arrested on January 23, 2012, on charges of "illegal public gathering." According to reports from a lawyer present at an interrogation as well as other detainees, Hassan 'Oun's body showed signs of torture and one of his legs was swollen. He told the lawyer that he was forced to stand for 11 hours straight, was beaten with a hose, and was threatened with rape. He had been detained once before in 2011 after involvement in anti-government protests, during which he was also allegedly tortured,

according to information he provided to the Bahrain Center for Human Rights. His brother is currently in hiding and is at risk of torture if he is discovered.

He was sentenced in the spring of 2011 to four years in prison on charges of inciting rioting following protests over the disputed Belarusian presidential election in December 2011.

IRAN

Women's dormitories at Allameh Tabatabaee University in Tehran were raided by authorities several times in February 2012 and students' rooms searched in what has become a frequent illegal practice at Iranian universities, according to a report from the International Campaign for Human Rights in Iran. In this particular set of raids, several students were removed and banned from the dorms, and one student was expelled for keeping "immoral films" on her computer. Since October 2011, authorities have sought to control the conduct and communications of students in the dorms through raids like these as well as the installation of surveillance cameras. In light of the invasion of their privacy, students refer to the dorms as "the glass room."

SHIRZAD KARIMI, a Kurdish university student and a member of the Kurdish Students Democratic Union, was given a three-year suspended prison sentence (meaning that he will not serve the prison sentence unless he is convicted of a subsequent crime) in February 2012 on charges of "propagation against the regime." He was arrested on

September 12, 2011, along with several other members of the Kurdish Students Democratic Union.

MOHSEN SANATIPOUR, a student activist and journalist, was sentenced to one year in prison. His arrest follows a two-semester university suspension in response to his involvement in pro-democracy activities. He was arrested in May 2009 by the Ministry of Intelligence.

ABOLFAZL TABARZADI, a civil engineering student and human rights activist, was transferred from Karoon Prison to the psychiatric ward of a hospital in Ahvaz due to the development of severe depression and paranoia while in prison. The transfer was made in January 2012. Tabarzadi began serving a nine-month sentence in October 2011 after being convicted of "acting against national security" and "contact with foreign media." Prior to his arrest he was fighting to gain visitation rights for political prisoners, such as his uncle, a fellow human rights activist. He remains under tight security in the hospital.

Previously featured students from Iran who remain in prison include: PAYMAN AREF, arrested on October 30, 2011, currently in jail, though the official charges against him remain unclear; ABDOLLAH MOMENI, a student activist and spokesman for Iran's largest reformist student organization currently in Evin Prison; MAHDIEH GOLROO, a student activist and member of the Right to Education Council in Tehran, currently serving a sentence of two years and four months in Evin Prison on charges of "propaganda against the regime," "congregation and mutiny," and cooperation with the Mojahedin Khalq Organization, an outlawed political group; MAJID TAVAKOLI and BAHA-REH HEDAYAT, distinguished student activists sentenced to eight-anda-half and nine-and-a-half years, respectively, for their involvement in anti-government protests in 2009; and BEHROOZ JAVID-TEHRANI, a student activist and prisoners' rights campaigner who was sentenced to seven years in jail in 2005. All are at risk of torture and need your support.

SUDAN

Over 300 students were arrested and many severely beaten in a police raid on dormitories at the University of Khartoum in the early morning hours of January 17, 2012. The arrests were an attempt to preempt planned student protests to take place the following weekend. The would-be protestors were calling for the removal of the director of the university, because of his decision to call police onto campus to disperse an earlier protest. These original student protests were in support of the al-Manasir ethnic group, who required compensation after being affected by the building of a dam.

ISLAM AL-DABBAS and MAJD AL-DIN KHOLANI, both students involved in organizing peaceful protests in and near Damascus since March 2011, were arrested on July 22 and August 8, 2011, respectively, and are being held incommunicado in undisclosed locations. According to reports from Amnesty International, both were beaten following their arrests and are at risk of torture.

GOOD NEWS: RELEASES

CHINA

ZHENG YICHUN, professor of English at Liaoning University, was released on January 19, 2012, after completing his seven-year sentence. He was arrested in 2004 on charges of "suspicion of inciting subversion of state power." He is now subject to three years of deprivation of political rights.

SUDAN

We are happy to report that PROFESSOR MOHAMED ZAIN AL-ABIDEEN, Dean of the College of Higher Education at the University of Al Zaiem Al Azhari in Omdurman, was released on March 4, 2012. He had been arrested on February 20, 2012 by the National Intelligence and Security Service. The arrest came shortly after the publication of an article critical of the government in the daily newspaper Al Tayar.

SYRIA

YASSIN ZIADEH, brother of human rights researcher and activist RADWAN ZIADEH, was released from prison in November 2011 after

being held without charge for four months. Yassin Ziadeh was wrongly held as part of the government's retaliation for his brother's research and human rights work.

VIETNAM

We welcome the release of PHAM MINH HOANG, a blogger and lecturer of mathematics at Ho Chi Minh City Polytechnic Institute, on January 13, 2012. Pham was sentenced on August 10, 2011, to three years in jail and three years of house arrest for belonging to Viet Tan, a banned prodemocracy group, and for publishing an anti-communist blog. While he was released after a significant reduction of his original sentence, the court upheld the three-year house arrest, which he is now serving.
