

## Preparation

## > Drawing/Imaging

In Drawing/Imaging students will engage with the ways that meaning is constructed and communicated through two-dimensional images. Projects introduce analog and digital skills and techniques that allow students to explore multiple ways of translating ideas and observations into two-dimensional form. Students explore visual organization and composition, and develop sensitivity to both representational and abstract form.

## > Space/Materiality

This course will investigate space and materiality through three lenses: *haptic* space and materiality, *inhabited* space and materiality, and *social* space and materiality. We will utilize the Parsons' modeling facilities and hybrid studio/shop classrooms to explore the ideas behind these approaches.

## > Time

Time is a human-made concept—it is something we have designed and continue to influence. Studio projects, readings, and creative references explore notions of frame, duration, and speed, to show how such constructs have evolved over the course of centuries to impact our understanding of time. Projects can utilize a variety of methods and media and students will be given an introduction to digital video editing (Adobe Premier) and multipage digital layout tools (InDesign).

## > Integrative Studio and Seminar 1 (or, the Integratives)

This is a set of paired courses—a studio and a liberal arts seminar—that are in active dialogue with one another. Students will be making, thinking, reading and writing in order to investigate topics common to both courses. The 3-hour seminar will emphasize verbal skills and the 6-hour studio will emphasize the dynamics of studio work. The aim of the Integratives is to generate new and unexpected connections between the two approaches.

# GRADUATE CONTINUING EDUCATION

## ART AND DESIGN EDUCATION

These graduate-level courses are tailored to artists, designers, and educators interested in teaching art and design at the college level. Taught online, they explore theoretical foundations of art and design education, new online tools, and practical aspects of classroom instruction.

## Web 2.0 Teaching Tools

Designed to provide a theoretical foundation for creative professionals who teach or are preparing to teach at the university level, this course examines the historical, cultural, and theoretical underpinnings of innovative pedagogy using digital and social media. Learning can involve conventional online shells, social networking sites and experiences, modalities such as podcasts and streaming video, and even the most current tools, such as ChatRoulette. Students learn to use a variety of these software tools and digital modes and consider how to use them effectively to deliver educational information at the university level. The final course assignment includes a project brief or lesson plan as well as the design of digital and social media components.

## Special Topics in Art and Design Education

Students explore the basics of teaching art and design courses at the university level. They develop and implement lessons, create inquiry-based dialogues about art and design, and find the most effective ways to interact with students during class critiques and discussions. The course examines distinctive aspects of teaching art and design, such as studio assignments, site visits, facilitating critiques, and cultural history and theory. By focusing on what is unique to art and design-based thinking and learning, students discover the importance of collaboration, iteration, reflective practice, and systems thinking in art and design curricula.

# TIME

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

(as of March 1, 2012)

This course is an introduction to the cultural and perceptual constructions of time. Students will engage with multiple experiences of time and the ways that they can be expressed or transformed through the use of a variety of analog and digital media. Historical references to the evolution of our notions of the frame, duration, and narrativity are introduced to provide context for student projects that investigate various forms of aesthetic progression to communicate ideas. Project might explore a range of forms including storyboarding, visual narrative, artists books, life cycle analysis, sound, video, and performance-based projects. Students will leave the course with a basic knowledge of creating digital audio-visual sequences. Projects encourage students to analyze how cultural constructs impact the way that work is perceived, and how this in turn affects the way we tell stories. The relationship of language to notions of time will be explored through discussion, critique, and written responses that will offer students the opportunity to contextualize and communicate ideas about their own work and that of their classmates.
