






#### Instructor's Narrative Description

New York City is a rich cultural ecosystem that is in a constant state of flux and growth. As artists and designers, how can we excavate the many layers that make up our urban environment as a vehicle that both inspires and informs our work? In Integrative Studio 1 students explore the people, places and artifacts that make up New York City's cultural past and present as a means of broadening their understanding of reflective writing, critical thinking, research, collaborative process and its application to a creative practice. Using both experiential and traditional research methods, students work in teams to pose questions, prototype and formulate design solutions through cross-disciplinary investigations. The research practice is deepened by visits to museums/libraries/site-specific locations and conducting personal interviews. In addition, a variety of culturally/historically significant New York City-based memoirs are introduced to support the development of critical voice and storytelling. Throughout the semester students confront the ongoing question, how do we bring a deeper level intention, emotional connection and value to the objects we create?

(The idea for the tile of this course came from a line in an interview by Joseph Beuys and a recent exhibition at the gallery Invisible Exports in New York City)

This course will pose a number of questions of students.



#### Instructor's Narrative Description

The city is a dynamic, multifaceted place as well as the nexus for complex ideas concerning social, political, and aesthetic life. We will use the web of meanings and visual experiences in New York for our investigation of image making and understanding. An intensive focus on observational drawing (perspectival, figure, and gestural) and the importance of gestalt principles of visual organization will go hand in hand with a host of digital image making tools (Illustrator, Photoshop and more). Our projects will explore iterations of an idea or motif, looking at how different types of image making can affect perception and meaning. We will explore a range of methods of transformation, including moving across digital programs (integrating illustrator and photoshop) scanning, collage, re-framing and other types of editing. The three sections of the course will follow the ideas of "moving space", "moving objects" and moving along (the story)". See project descriptions for more specifics.


