SCHOLARS AND RESEARCHERS: NEW AND CONTINUING CASES

BAHRAIN

Previously featured scholars from Bahrain who remain in prison include JALILA AL-SALMAN and MAHDI 'ISSA MAHDI ABU DHEEB, both board members of the Bahrain Teachers' Association, sentenced to six months and five years, respectively, on October 21, 2012, on charges of "inciting hatred against the regime" and "calling to overthrow and change the regime by force"; **DR. ABDUL-JALIL AL-SINGACE**, professor of engineering at the University of Bahrain, sentenced to life in prison on charges of training and financing a terrorist organization; and **RULA AL-SAFFER**, assistant professor at the College of Health Sciences and head of the Bahrain Nursing Society, sentenced on September 29, 2011, to 15 years in prison.

Previously featured scholar **ENOH MEYOMESSE**, a writer, political activist, historian, and founder of the Cameroon Writers Association, remains in prison. He was sentenced to seven years in prison on December 27, 2012, on charges of illegally trafficking gold.

CHINA

Authorities are continuing to retaliate against imprisoned human rights activist and 2011 Nobel Peace Prize laureate LIU XIAOBO by targeting members of his family, this time his brother-in-law, LIU HUI, who was arrested in March 2013 and sentenced to 11 years of imprisonment on June 9, 2013, on charges of financial fraud over a real estate dispute. According to lawyers, the dispute was resolved months prior to the arrest and the criminal charges are unfounded. Liu Xiaobo, who has been featured numerous times in Endangered Scholars Worldwide, has been held in Jinzhou Prison since his arrest in December 2008 for "inciting subversion of state power." His wife, Liu Xia, has been under house arrest since Liu Xiaobo was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2010. Family friend and lawyer Pu Zhiqiang has stated that the intimidation of Liu Xiaobo's family members represents a wider pattern of selective use of the law by Chinese authorities to keep dissidents in line.

Other scholars featured in previous issues who remain in prison in China include writer and editor TASHI RABTEN (pen name TE'URANG), sentenced to four years' imprisonment on June 2, 2011, for his critical political writings; and GUO QUAN, a former literature professor at Nanjing Normal University, sentenced to 10 years in prison and 3 years of deprivation of political rights in October 2009 on charges of "inciting subversion of state power."

IRAN

According to sources at Amnesty International, the Iranian supreme court has overturned the death sentence of ABDOLREZA GHANBARI, a teacher of Persian literature arrested following the 2009 presidential election protests. Ghanbari had been sentenced to death on January 30, 2010, on charges of "enmity against God." His sentence was upheld at an appeals court in April 2010, and a request for a pardon rejected on February 28, 2012. According to reports from Amnesty International, Ghanbari was forced to make false confessions under duress and was unable to be represented by his lawyer, who was also serving a prison sentence during his trial. While the overturning of the death sentence is a welcome development, Ghanbari remains imprisoned and at risk of torture, and the sentence could be reinstated.

Scholars from Iran who remain in prison include ARZHANG DAVOODI, a poet, teacher, and cofounder of the pro-Western Confederation for Iranian Students (CIS), imprisoned since October 2003; two academics and members of the Iranian Writers Association (IWA), MANIJEH NAJM ERAGHI and DR. FARIBORZ RAIS DANA, arrested on June 3, 2012, and May 21, 2012, respectively, for their membership in the IWA, a group that promotes writers' rights in Iran, and sentenced to one year in prison; SAEED MADANI, a sociologist and member of the Nationalist-Religious Front, held without charge since January 7, 2012; MASSOUD SEPEHR, a political science lecturer at Shiraz Azad University, detained without charge since his arrest on November 17, 2011; seven people connected to the Baha'i Institute for Higher Education, following coordinated attacks on the Institute in May 2011, including KAMRAN MORTEZAIE and VAHID MAHMOUDI, each sentenced to five years, and RAMIN ZIBAIE, MAHMOUD BADAVAM, FARHAD SEDGHI, RIAZ SOBHANI, and NOUSHIN KHADEM, each sentenced to four years; four cultural figures, all charged with "acting against national security" through supporting Kurdish opposition groups, including poet JAMAL KHANI, serving a two-year sentence; educator FARHAD VAKILINIA, serving three years; NAEEM NAJAFI, a student, serving four years, and Kurdish author and scholar SAJJAD JAHANFAR, serving one year; SAEED

LEILAZ, a journalist and professor of economics at Shahid Beheshti University, convicted in 2009 of violating public order, planning to undermine the country's security, and insulting Iran's Supreme Leader; DR. MOHAMMAD MALEKI, former chancellor of Tehran University, held in Evin Prison since August 2009 on charges of "propaganda against the regime"; and DR. MOSTAFA ALAVI, an Iranian doctor and researcher sentenced to 15 years in August 2008 for "plotting against the regime."

ISRAEL

A four-month extension has been added to the already two-year pre-trial detention of AHMED QATAMESH, a political scientist and Palestinian activist, beginning from April 29, 2013. Amnesty International issued a statement claiming that the academic is being held in order to deter other left-wing Palestinian activists. This is the sixth time Qatamesh's detention without charge has been extended by authorities since his arrest by Israeli security forces on April 21, 2011. Authorities claim he poses a security threat due to his alleged involvement with the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine (PFLP). Qatamesh claims that he has not been involved with the PFLP for 14 years, although he was a supporter of the group in the 1990s. He suffers from undiagnosed ailments causing nausea and fainting, but has been barred from seeing a doctor. Qatamesh was also held in detention without charge for five years by Israeli authorities from 1993 to 1998, which was the subject of

a book made up of his prison notes and which includes allegations of torture by Israeli officials.

Previously featured scholars from Italy who remain in prison include six scientists convicted in October 2012 on charges of manslaughter for failing to predict an earthquake that devastated the city of L'Aquila in 2009, including enzo boschi, franco barberi, bernardo de BERNARDIS, GIULIO SALVAGI, CALVI GIANMICHELE, and CLAUDIO EVA.

MONGOLIA

ROLMAAJIDIIN TSENGEL, a southern Mongolian historian and translator, began a hunger strike in early June 2013 to protest the Mongolian authority's accusation against him of attempting to overthrow the government and by carrying out a coup. He was arrested on May 6, 2012, after aiding in the translation of Chinese materials for a documentary film about seventeenth-century Mongolian history. According to a report from the Southern Mongolian Human Rights Information Center, Tsengel's lawyer has stated that the arrest is based on false

charges and was prompted by the intervention of the Chinese government. Tsengel, formerly a Chinese citizen, had renounced his Chinese citizenship and was seeking asylum in Mongolia. According to the same report, Tsengel has been subject to torture during his detention and has not been allowed visitors.

Previously featured scholars from Russia who remain in prison are SVYATOSLAV BOBYSHEV and YEVGENY AFANASYEV, both professors at Baltic State Technical University in St. Petersburg, who were sentenced at a closed trial in June 2012 to 12 years in prison on charges of passing secret information to the Chinese government.

SAUDI ARABIA

A court ordered the arbitrary four-month detention of DR. ABDUL KAREEM YOUSEF AL-KHODER, a professor of comparative jurisprudence at Qassim University, on April 25, 2013. He has been on trial since January 2013 on charges of disobeying the ruler, inciting disorder by organizing demonstrations, disseminating false information to foreign groups, and taking part in an unlicensed organization. The

charges came after he founded a human rights organization called the Saudi Civil and Political Rights Organization. No reasons were given for the detention and neither al-Khoder nor his lawyer was allowed to meet with the judge after the trial. He is currently being held at Buraydah prison.

Previously featured scholars from Saudi Arabia who remain in prison include DR. SA'UD MUKHTAR AL-HASHIMI, a medical doctor and faculty member at the King Abdulaziz University, sentenced in November 2011 to 30 years in prison, which is to be followed by a 30-year travel ban; DR. YUSUF AL-AHMAD, an Islamic scholar who teaches at Imam Muhammad bin Sa'ud University in Riyadh, arrested after posting a YouTube video critical of long-term detentions of security suspects without due juridical process; NADHIR AL-MAJID, a teacher and writer, detained on April 17, 2011, soon after the appearance of an article in which he criticized the Saudi government; and university professors SA'UD AL-DUGHAITHIR, MUHAMMAD BIN NASIR AL-GHAMIDI, and ABD AL-KARIM AL-KHADHAR, all members of a group of nine intellectuals who drafted a party proposal seeking to create what would have been the first political party in Saudi Arabia; they were arrested on February 16, 2011.

TURKEY

The trial of previously featured scholar BÜSRA ERSANLI, a constitutional law expert and professor of political science at Marmara University in Istanbul, recommenced on May 27, 2013, after a pause since July 2012. She faces charges of "leadership of an illegal organization," punishable under Turkey's Anti-Terrorism Laws for her membership in the constitutional commission of the Peace and Democracy Party (BDP), a political party that Turkish authorities allege is linked to the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK), which is banned in Turkey. Several organizations, such as Scholars at Risk, have claimed that Ersanli is being targeted for peaceful expressive activities and that any charges related to these activities be dismissed.

Previously featured scholars from Turkey who remain in prison are KEMAL GÜRÜZ, a former university rector and retired professor at Middle East Technical University in Ankara, arrested on June 25, 2012, on charges related to the political transition in Turkey in 1997; AYSE BERKTAY, a historian, translator, and women's activist, arrested in October 2011 as part of a crackdown on the pro-Kurdish Peace and Democracy Party (BDP); FATIH HILMIOGLU, former rector of Inönü University in Malatya, detained since April 2009 on charges of attempting to violently overthrow the government; and DR. MEHMET HABERAL, founder and dean of Baskent University in Ankara and an expert on organ transplants, held in detention without trial since 2009, on charges of involvement with a terrorist organization.

Previously featured students who remain in jail include student activist AHMED AOUN, arrested by authorities when he sought treatment at a hospital following an eye injury inflicted by police during protests on May 13, 2012; and six students, all sentenced to 15 years in prison at a trial on March 5, 2012, as part of a crackdown on student involvement in pro-democracy demonstrations, including JAWAD AL-MAHARY, SHAWQI RADHI, JASSIM AL HULAINI, JASSIM AL-MUKHODHER, and YOUSIF AHMED. To our knowledge the name of the sixth student has not been released.

He was detained after protests in November 9, 2012, which called for greater rights for Tibetans, in particular the use of Tibetan as their language of instruction in their schools.

IRAN

ASHKAN ZAHABIAN and AFSHIN KESHTKARI, both student activists, were arrested on May 27 and 18, 2013, respectively, as part of a crackdown on dissidents just prior to the June 2013 presidential election. Zahabian was taken by authorities to Babol Prison to serve an eightmonth sentence on charges of "acting against national security" and "spreading propaganda against the system." Zahabian had been arrested previously in 2009 as a result of his support of Mehdi Karroubi's presidential campaign. Keshtkari was summoned to the Revolutionary Court of Shiraz to serve six months in prison. He was convicted of "forming an illegal group with the intention of harming national security." He is

a founding member of the Islamic Student Association at the University of Technology in Shiraz. According to Amnesty International, the timing and manner of the two arrests indicates that they were intended to deter other students from taking part in student activism surrounding the presidential election.

Previously featured students from Iran who remain in prison include: OMID KOKABEE, a PhD student in physics, sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment in July 2012 on charges of communicating with a hostile government and taking illegal earnings; MOHSEN SANATIPOUR, a student activist and journalist, sentenced to one year in prison in the spring of 2012; ABOLFAZL TABARZADI, a civil engineering student and human rights activist, serving nine months since October 2011 after being convicted of "acting against national security" and "contact with foreign media"; student activist JAVAD ALIKHANI, arrested on May 28, 2010, and charged with "propagating against the regime," "acting against national security," "blasphemy," and "insulting the Supreme Leader"; ABDOLLAH MOMENI, a student activist and spokesman for Iran's largest reformist student organization, currently in Evin Prison; SOROUSH SABET, serving a two-year sentence in connection with his involvement in protests in 2007; LEVA KHANJANI, a member of the persecuted Baha'i religious minority, banned from receiving further education and serving a two-year sentence in connection with her involvement in protests in 2009; SAYED ZIAODDIN (ZIA) NABAVI, serving a 10-year sentence after attending protests following the 2009 elections; NASIM SOLTAN BEIGI, serving a six-year sentence for "propaganda against the regime" and "assembly and collusion against national security"; and MAJID TAVAKOLI and BAHAREH HEDAYAT, distinguished student activists sentenced to eight-and-a-half and nine-and-a-half years, respectively, for their involvement in antigovernment protests in 2009. All are at risk of torture and need your support.

TURKEY

Previously featured scholar PINAR SELEK, a writer, feminist, and PhD candidate in political science at the University of Strasbourg, was convicted in absentia on January 24, 2013, and sentenced to aggravated life imprisonment for her alleged role in a 1998 explosion at an Istanbul market. As a result of her sociological research on Kurdish issues she was charged with "membership in an illegal organization" under Turkey's Anti-Terror Law. Selek fled Turkey prior to the trial, and a warrant for her arrest has been issued and sent to Interpol.

VIETNAM

Student activists Dinh Nguyen Kha and Nguyen Phuong Uyen were sentenced to eight and six years in prison, respectively, on charges of "conducting propaganda against the state" at a trial in May 2013. The two were arrested in October 2012 for handing out leaflets critical of the government. The leaflets, signed by a group called Patriotic Youth, accused the Vietnamese government of allowing China to exploit Vietnamese natural resources and take over neighboring islands.

TUNISIA

We are happy to report that **DR. HABIB KAZDAGHLI**, scholar of minority rights and dean of the Faculty of Letters, Arts, and Humanities at the University of Manouba, was acquitted of all charges on May 2, 2013. He had been charged with "violence perpetrated by a civil servant in the course of his duties" and faced up to five years' imprisonment. The charges arose after a physical confrontation between Kazdaghli and two ultraconservative Muslim protesters who had entered the dean's office and were destroying his papers. This occurred in the midst of efforts by Salafists (a conservative Muslim group) to introduce Shari'a law into the workings of the university, efforts Kazdaghli vocally opposed.
